



Down On The Farm Year R Summer 1

Key Learning

During Summer 1, the children in Reception will be focussing their learning around farmyards. To start this topic, we will be going on a school trip to visit Longdown Farm, where the children will have lots of opportunities to see, touch, hold, feed and learn about farm animals.

We will be learning what a farm is and why we have farms. We will explore the produce that farmers grow/produce (including meat, milk, eggs, wool, plants, grains, etc) and will learn about where our food comes from. E.g. where eggs come from and what we use eggs for. The children will be invited to participate in Farm Dress Up Day, which will involve lots of fun activities, such as creating masks, fun games and even a Barnyard Dance! Using all the information that the children will have learnt at this point, they will then be asked to create their own riddles for a farm animal!

There are some exciting visitors this half term- the children will learn about tractors, what they are used for and how they have changed over the years within farming. We are going to end the half term by focussing on the traditional tale of 'The Three Little Pigs' which will provide lots of opportunities for learning and retelling the story!
